Holy Gospel

Luke 2:22–40

When the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said,

"Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word;

for my eyes have seen your salvation

that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles,

and for glory to your people Israel."

And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed."

And there was a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived with her husband seven years from when she was a virgin, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She did not depart from the temple, worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day. And coming up at that very hour she began to give thanks to God and to speak of him to all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem.

And when they had performed everything according to the Law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. And the favor of God was upon him.

Sermon Text – Luke 2:22-40 Theme – "Christmas is for Children"

"Christmas is for children." We hear that so often; don't we? And it's true. The Christmas services and songs, the stories about a baby seem to be made just for children. Add to that the gifts under the tree and the treats and the Grandmas and Grandpas who come to visit. Some might think at Christmastime, "Oh, to be a child again."

Christmas IS for children and not just for those who are children by virtue of their age and size. We are all children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. Christmas is for all of us who have become a brother or sister of Jesus Christ by faith.

What a tragedy Christmas becomes for anyone who doesn't know Jesus by faith. That's why for many Christmas is a time of depression and loneliness. For some it is even a time of drunkenness as they try to forget all their sorrow and pain that comes when they think that you must be six years old and four feet tall to experience the joy of Christmas.

Our text this morning is about two "children" who truly enjoyed Christmas. In the eyes of most Americans today these two people had very little to be happy about. Both of them probably lived alone. Simeon was an old man getting close to the time when men die. Anna was at least 84 years old and we're told that she was a widow. They are two lonesome, people, close to death, with perhaps no close family. They are two people who would have had the world's blessing to cry themselves to sleep.

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These two people are Simeon and Anna who were many years away from the time when they were little children. Yet they were children in the eyes of God in a very important way. It says in our text that Simeon was **"waiting for the consolation of Israel"** (Luke 2:25). We are also told that Anna spoke about the child **"to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem"** (Luke 2:38). What those two sentences tell us is that Simeon and Anna trusted in God's promise to send a Savior.

That simple trust put them in the minority. You see, many of God's people in Israel were looking for a Savior who would be a political powerhouse and a military warrior with an army to drive the Romans from their soil. Simeon knew that Jesus'' mission on earth was to die for sin, destroy the devil, and deliver from death. That's why Simeon said to Mary, **"This child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed (and a sword will pierce through your own souls also)"** (Luke 2:34-35). By faith Simeon knew that because Jesus came to save souls and not to send soldiers, His ministry would be under attack, His Messiahship would be questioned, and His message would be rejected by many.

Anna too was a child of God by faith. Our text tells us that she was a **"prophetess."** That means Anna studied her Bible and explained it to others. If she were around today she might well have been a Sunday School teacher. In any case, she looked forward to her Savior coming.

Christmas and its never-ending joy of forgiveness, peace with God, and the promises of heaven are for God's children like Simeon and Anna. It is for all God's children. It's for you and for me who are God's children and are a part of His family by faith.

God has made us His children as He worked faith in our hearts. God gives us, His children, special blessings – the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. He wants us, His children, to be nourished in the faith. That's why He has given us His Word and Sacraments.

Yes, Christmas is for children, young or old, rich or poor, those with family and those who are all alone. Christmas is for children like you and like me who simply and humbly trust in Jesus as our Lord and Savior!

One of the things we admire most about children is that they speak their mind. When they are happy, they're not afraid to show it and to say it. That's why Simeon and Anna were true children of God. They had not lost their love for speaking simple words what was in their hearts. Not only did Simeon speak the beautiful words of the "Nunc Dimittis" which we often sing after receiving Holy Communion, but he also prophesied to Mary of how Jesus would be a Savior that would bring about either the rising or the falling of many people.

Anna too acts like a little child who has just opened up a Christmas present. "Look what I got for Christmas!" As our text puts it this way: "Coming up to them at that very moment she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were looking forward to the redemption of Jerusalem."

Christmas is for children. It's for those who believe like children of God. It's for those who speak like children of God. It's for those who live like children of God. St. Luke describes Simeon as being righteous and devout. That means he lived life like we are all supposed to live. He thought about God. He worshiped God in church. He showed kindness and consideration to others.

We also read about Anna's obedience: She never left the temple but worshiped day and night, fasting and praying. Her life was a life of service to the Lord God. She sacrificed and denied herself things for the sake of his Kingdom. She prayed for the good of the church. She spent a lot of time in God's House.

On this Sunday which brings us to an end another year, there are still prayers that need to be said. Devout and dedicated men and women are still needed in the service of the church.

Christmas is for children, all of God's children. It's for the lonely, for the old, for the sinful, for the dying, for those with trials and troubles, for those with or without a family. It's for every sinner who wants to be a part of God's family. That's why God sent his Son Jesus to us, so that his Son Jesus might bring us to him! Christmas is for children. Oh that you and I might never grow up! AMEN

We give thanks for our brothers and sisters who have departed in the peace of faith. Bring us with them to see with our own eyes the light of the nations and the glory of Israel. Into Your hands, O Lord, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in Your mercy; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. **Amen.**
