First Reading Acts 1:12–26

Then [the apostles] returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away. And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers.

In those days Peter stood up among the brothers (the company of persons was in all about 120) and said, "Brothers, the Scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit spoke beforehand by the mouth of David concerning Judas, who became a guide to those who arrested Jesus. For he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry." (Now this man bought a field with the reward of his wickedness, and falling headlong he burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out. And it became known to all the inhabitants of Jerusalem, so that the field was called in their own language Akeldama, that is, Field of Blood.) "For it is written in the Book of Psalms,

"'May his camp become desolate, and let there be no one to dwell in it';

and

"'Let another take his office.'

So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these men must become with us a witness to his resurrection." And they put forward two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also called Justus, and Matthias. And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was numbered with the eleven apostles.

#### **Epistle**

1 Peter 4:12-19; 5:6-11

Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when his glory is revealed. If you are insulted for the name of Christ, you are blessed, because the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you. But let none of you suffer as a murderer or a thief or an evildoer or as a meddler. Yet if anyone suffers as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God in that name. For it is time for judgment to begin at the household of God; and if it begins with us, what will be the outcome for those who do not obey the gospel of God? And

"If the righteous is scarcely saved, what will become of the ungodly and the sinner?"

Therefore let those who suffer according to God's will entrust their souls to a faithful Creator while doing good....

Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you, casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you. Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world. And after you have suffered a little while, the God of all grace, who has called you to his eternal glory in Christ, will himself restore, confirm, strengthen, and establish you. To him be the dominion forever and ever. Amen.

#### Sermon Text - Acts 1:12-26 Theme - Waiting

Our text for today tells us what the Church did in the time between Jesus' ascension into heaven and the day He sent the Holy Spirit. Last Thursday, by the way was Ascension Day. This coming Sunday will be Pentecost. What did the Church do in that time? They waited. That's what Jesus had told them to do. He told them to wait in Jerusalem "until [they were] clothed with power from on high" (Luke 24:49). Ten days they waited. Sometimes waiting is not an easy thing to do because most of the time we want what we want when we want it.

Oftentimes, though, God makes His people wait. God made Abraham wait 25 years for his promised son, Isaac to be born. God made the children of Israel wait 400 years in Egypt before He brought them up out of that land of slavery. God waited thousands of years before He sent His own Son to fulfill the promise made at the time of Adam and Eve that the offspring of a

woman would crust their temper's head. Jesus is the One who brings us out of our slavery to sin.

What God does in these times of waiting is to prepare His people for what He is about to do. If you think about it then, the ten days Jesus' disciples had to wait until they were "clothed with power from on high" doesn't sound so bad when you compare it to 25 years, 400 years, or thousands of years that others had to wait.

So, what was the Church doing in those ten days of waiting? Our text tells us that they devoted "themselves to prayer" (Acts 1:14). In those days, the prayer book of the Church was the book of Psalms. Through His Word, God was preparing the Church in their time of waiting for what was about to happen.

It is obvious that the Church was making use of the book of Psalms in this time, for it was the book of Psalms that told them that Judas' place would "become desolate" (Psalm 69:25 & Acts 1:20) and it was the book of Psalms that told them that another should "take [Judas'] place" (Psalm 109:8 & Acts 1:20).

The work of the Church would go on. God was not giving up on them even though the other eleven had done things which were in His eyes just as bad as what Judas had done. Peter had denied; Thomas had doubted; James and John had sought glory; all of the eleven had struggled to believe. God could still use them, though, just as He can still use people who are sinful and flawed to fill the office of ministry.

So, the Church filled the office left vacant by Judas. They prayed to God asking Him to show them which of the two candidates God had "chosen" (Acts 1:24) to fill that office. We are told that the Church "casts lots ... and the lot fell on Matthias" (Acts 1:26).

It almost sounds as though they flipped a coin or drew straws to see which of the two should be the 12<sup>th</sup> disciple. I have to tell you, there is some debate among Bible scholars about this. Some make the argument that the Greek can also mean that a vote was taken and the one who got the most votes was Matthias.

That roughly parallels the way a congregation chooses the pastor they want to call. In my role as Circuit Visitor, these past 26 years, I have helped the congregations of the Brainerd Circuit work through 30 different call processes. In some of these the congregations waited six months before they got a new pastor; in couple of these, the congregation had to wait four years before they got a new pastor. What was God doing in these times of waiting? He was preparing His people for what He was about to do.

Like the Church in our text, the Church today is waiting. We are not waiting to be clothed with the Holy Spirit. That happened on Pentecost and that happens whenever anyone is baptized. What we are waiting for is Jesus to come again.

He came the first time to suffer, die, and rise again to free us from the guilt of sin. He is going to

come a second time to raise up all the dead and give eternal life to all believers.

So, what is the Church to do in this time of waiting? The example of early Church would be a good one to follow. We are to make use of God's Word and prayer. It is the Word of God that the Holy Spirit uses to keep us in the faith. And, when we pray, we do as Peter tells us to do in our epistle less for today. We are "casting all [our] anxieties on him, [who] cares for us" (1 Peter 5:7).

That is something we will want to do especially when experience the "fiery trials" that our epistle lesson talks about. They come to "test" us (1 Peter 4:12).

In those times, the Word of God will be there to encourage us and to strengthen us. In those times we can take it to the Lord in prayer. And we can "rejoice insofar as [we] share Christ's sufferings, that [we] may also rejoice band be glad when his glory is revealed" (1 Peter 4:13). When His glory is revealed all our waiting will be over. AMEN

Where war and violence threaten, bring peace and justice. Where oppression reigns, bring liberty. Watch over those who defend us, especially the men and women of our armed forces and those who protect within our communities.

Lord, You have saved us by Your grace. We pray for the sick, the distressed, those whose hearts are heavy, those whose lives are burdened, those who mourn and all who are in any need [especially\_\_\_\_\_\_]. Grant them healing according to Your will, strength and mercy according to their needs, and the peace that passes understanding.

Heavenly Father, as the first Christians devoted themselves to prayer and worship following Christ's glorious ascension, preserve us in the same until we are raised with all the saints to Your heavenly kingdom; through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**
